The *Let Us Pray* prayer formation group's June prayer form will be Centering Prayer, a contemplative form of silent prayer that opens us to God's presence and action within. Rooted in the Christian contemplative tradition and renewed in modern times through the work of Fr Thomas Keating, it invites us to move beyond words and thoughts into a simple, loving awareness of God, fostering interior stillness, trust, and surrender. Our sessions will introduce the practice of Centering Prayer, guiding participants step-by-step into silence, helping them to rest in God's presence and grow in openness to divine love at work within. The Rev'd Canon David McCormick TSSF will be leading us in prayer. Come, and discover a gentle path into silence and stillness at the heart of the Christian life.

Devotion of the Month – to the Sacred Heart of Jesus: During the month of June, we are all encouraged to develop a greater devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. St John Paul II (in June 2002) explained that to save man, the victim of his own disobedience, God wanted to give him a ‘new heart’ that would be faithful to His loving will. This heart is the Heart of Jesus, the Holy Spirit’s masterpiece, which began to beat in Mary’s virginal womb and was pierced by the spear as Jesus hung on the cross, becoming for all an inexhaustible source of eternal life. Pope Benedict (in May 2006) told us that devotion to the Heart of Jesus exhorts believers to open themselves to the mystery of God and of His Love, and to allow themselves to be transformed by it... So let us all try to open ourselves up to God’s Love, and may our hearts overflow with gratitude for the many blessings and graces that have been bestowed upon us and those whom we love. You can begin a Novena to the Sacred Heart of Jesus on Thursday 4th June, ready for the Feast Day on Friday 12th June. Copies of the Litany of the Sacred Heart of Jesus will also be available at the back of church.

Saint of the Week – St Boniface, the “Apostle of the Germans”: On Friday 5th June, we remember St Boniface – an English Benedictine monk who gave up being elected abbot to devote his life to the conversion of the Germanic tribes. His life story is characterised by two key themes: his Christian orthodoxy, and his fidelity to the Pope of Rome. At the request of Pope Gregory II, Boniface set out on his first missionary journey in 719: paganism was a way of life, and what Christianity he did find had either lapsed into paganism, or was mixed with error. On feeding back to Pope Gregory II, the Holy Father then instructed him to reform the German Church. With the support of the powerful Frankish ruler, Charles Martel, Boniface was finally made a regional bishop and went on to do just that. In what must have been a painful, thankless and often bewildering task, Boniface managed to restore the obedience of the clergy to their bishops in union with the Pope of Rome, as well as establishing many houses of prayer in the form of Benedictine monasteries. A great number of Anglo-Saxon monks and nuns had followed him to the continent, and Boniface introduced the Benedictine nuns to the active apostolate of education – so essential for Church Reform. Boniface’s life ended on mission to the Frisians, where he and 53 of his companions were massacred while preparing converts for confirmation. St Boniface: in a world where the culture is often far from the truth and Christian vision, please pray for us!
